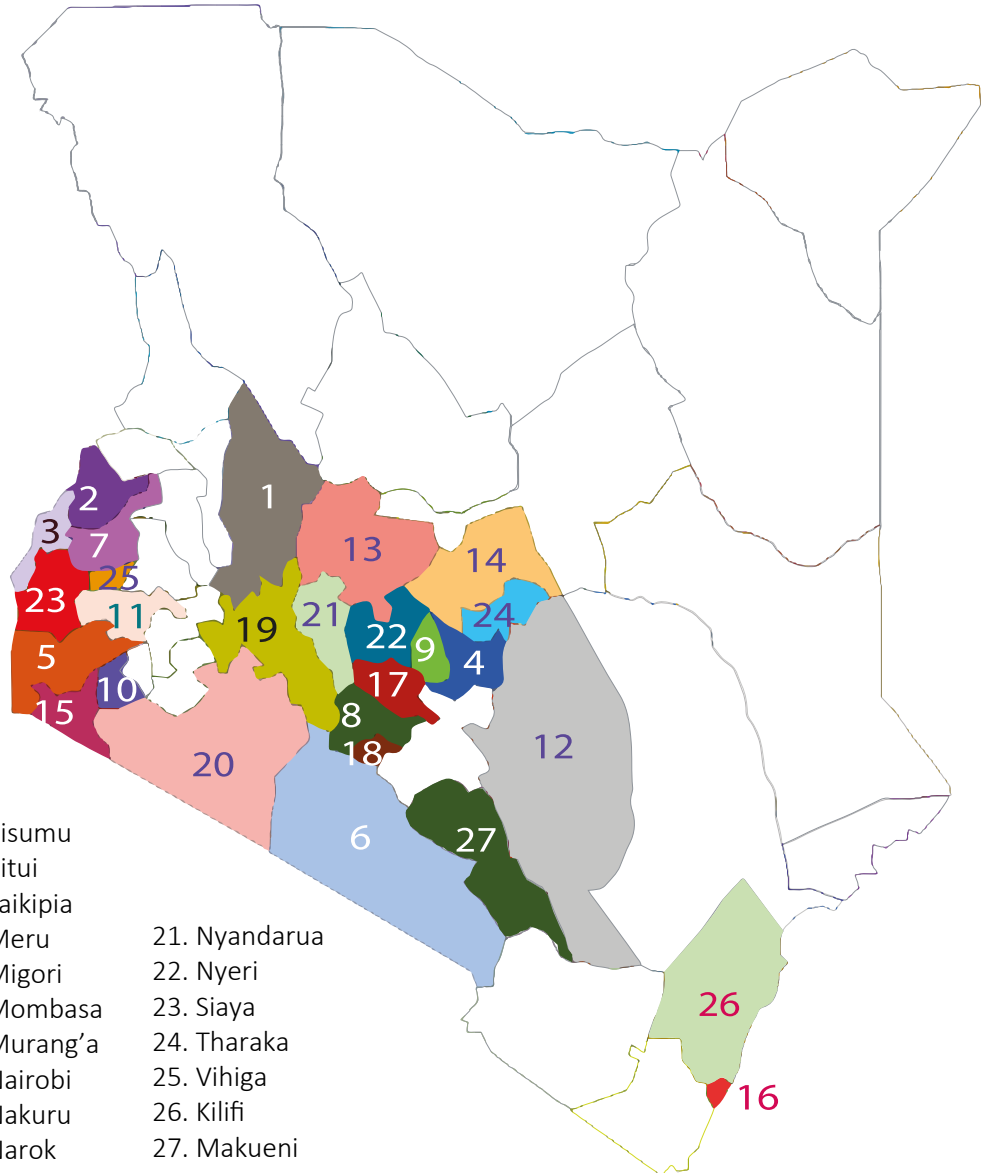

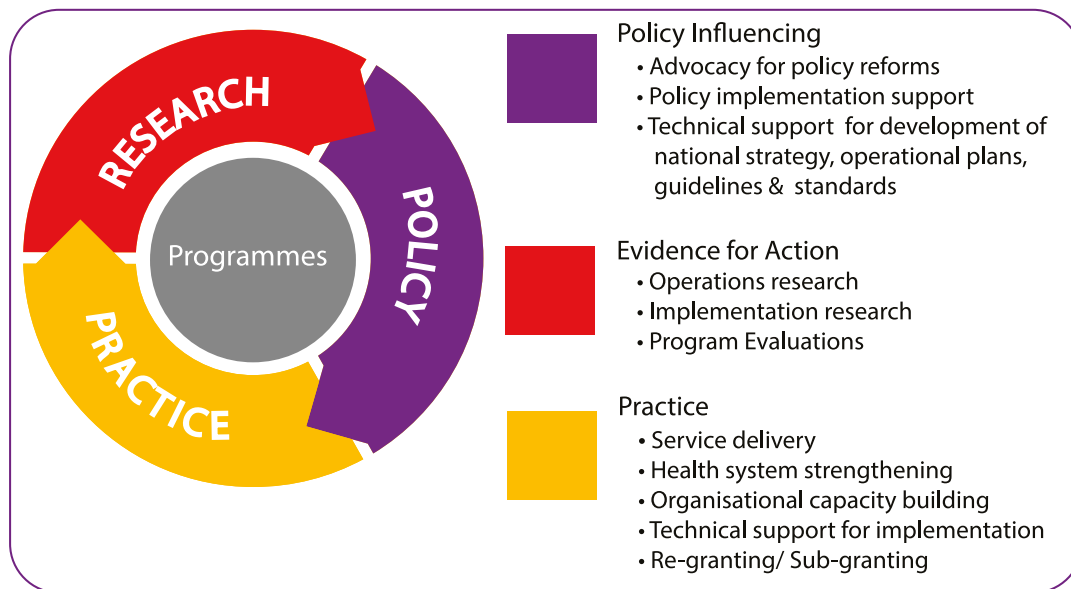

Our Core Programme Areas

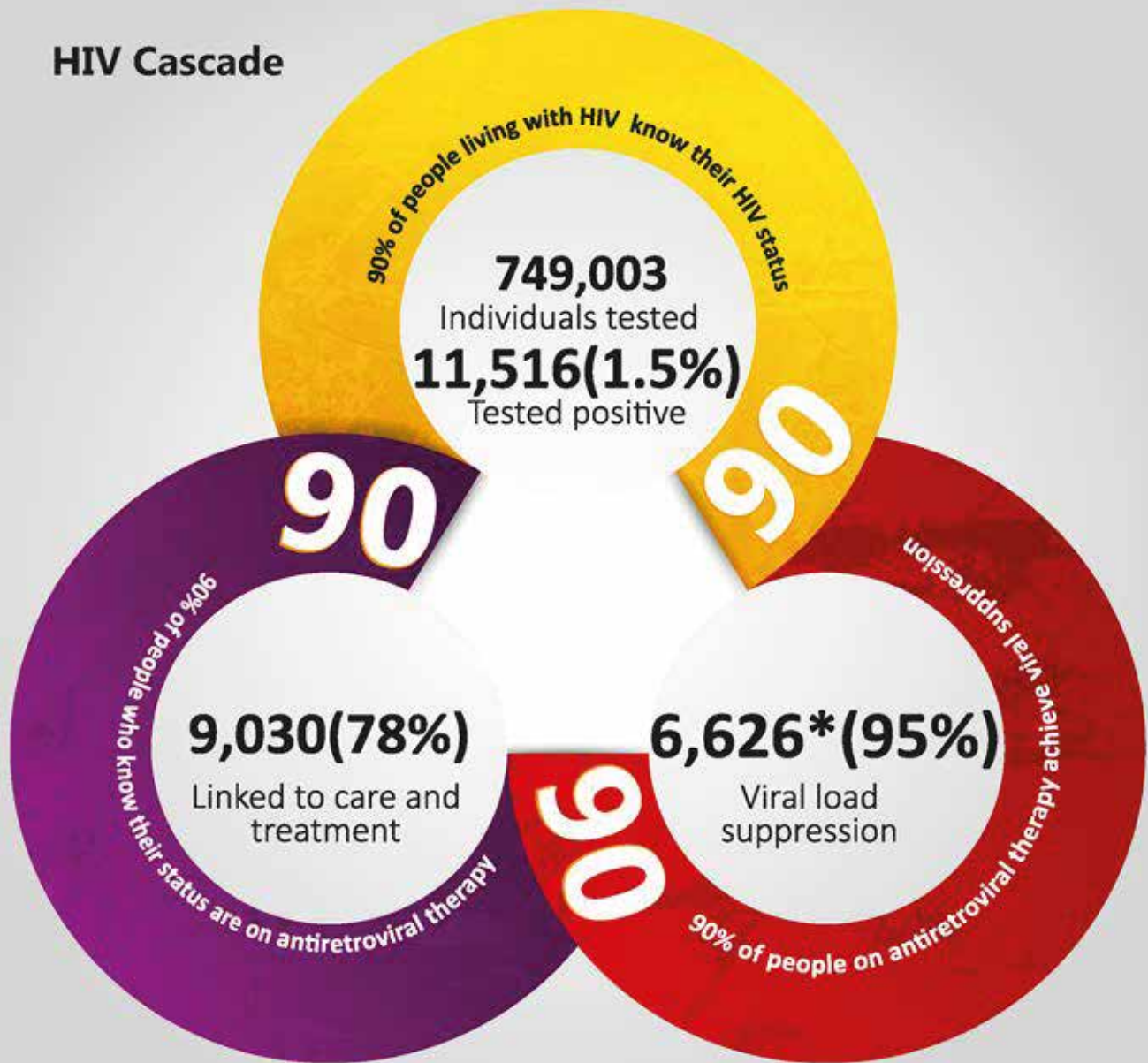
- **HIV Prevention:** To contribute to global and national goals of reducing new HIV infections
- **HIV Testing Services:** To identify HIV positive persons and link them to care and treatment and the HIV negative to appropriate HIV prevention interventions
- **HIV Care and Treatment:** To improve the quality of life of persons living with HIV and contribute to reducing HIV related mortality and morbidity and increasing equitable access to universal health coverage
- **Gender Based Violence:** To prevent GBV and offer appropriate responses when it occurs, to provide support to public health facilities to ensure survivors of violence receive quality services and are prevented from HIV infection
- **Community Health:** To strengthen Community health systems for impact on key health outcomes using a quality improvement approach

● Our Performance 2017-2018 ●

In 2017 - 2018, we implemented different strategies to reach more than 2 million people in 27 counties. We contributed to the national and global fast track goals of ensuring that 90% of the HIV infected persons know their status, 90% of those identified are initiated on ART and 90% of those on ART attain viral suppression. We provided technical support to civil society organisations, the Kenya Government, and private sector in strengthening responses to HIV prevention, care and treatment, Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH) and SGBV interventions.

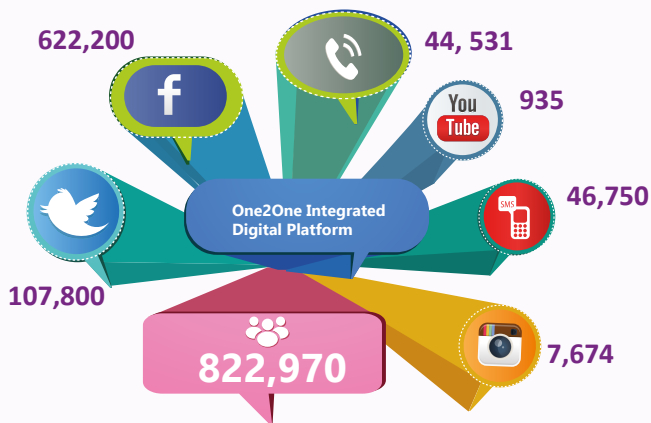

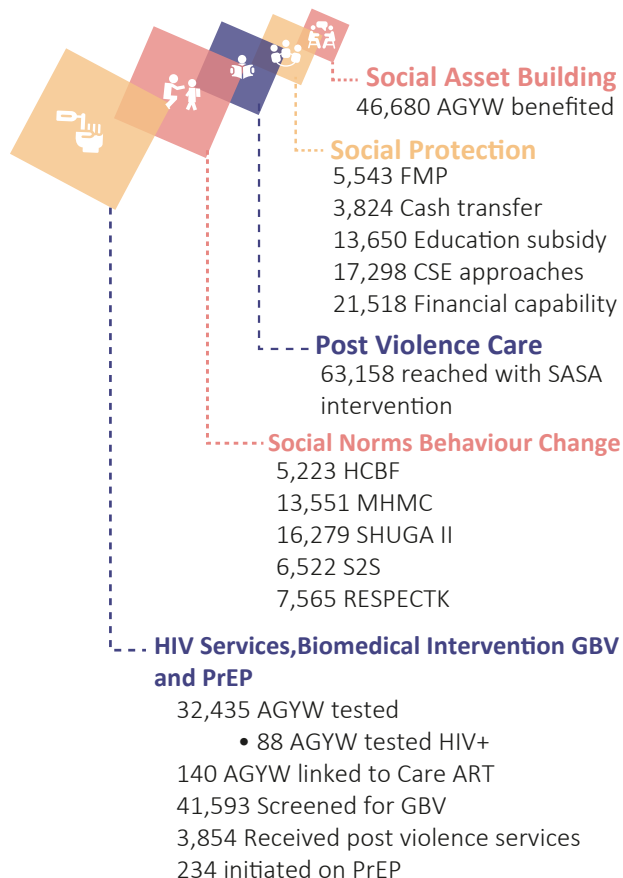
Youth Programming

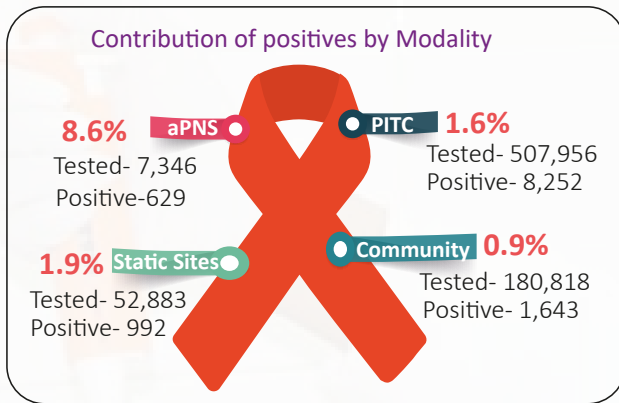


HIV Testing

749,003 Individuals were tested for HIV with a positivity rate of 1.5% (11,516 individuals)

2,114 (7.3%) out of **29,151** newly tested individuals tested HIV positive

914 (91%) Key Population (MSM, FSW and PWID) were linked to care and treatment

5 Sites in Nairobi distributed **306** HIV self-testing kits

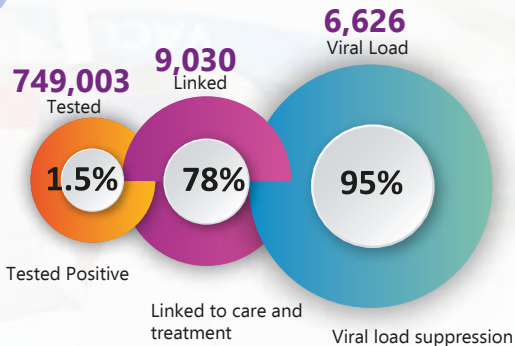


Strategies employed for identification of HIV positive persons

1. Provider initiated testing and counselling (PITC)
2. Community testing which includes: Outreach HTS in hot spots, Door to door home based testing and counselling
3. Assisted Partner Notification Services
4. Static community sites (voluntary counselling and testing, and community HIV prevention sites)- these include drop in centres (DICES)

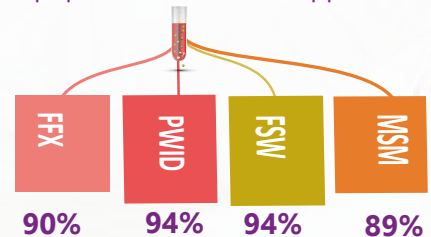


HIV Care and Treatment

Tuberculosis (TB)



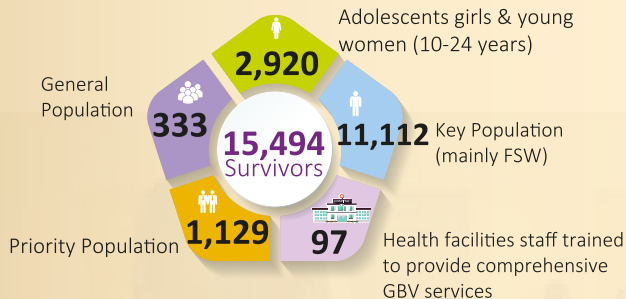

Gender Based Violence

During the year in review, 15,494 survivors across the population groups were attended to at LVCT Health supported facilities/DICEs received GBV services. 713 experienced sexual violence while 14,781 experienced physical/emotional violence.



Strengthening Community Health Systems

We worked with 27 Work Improvement Teams (WITs) in 9 Sub-Counties in Kitui, Migori and Nairobi counties, to improve the quality of implementation of the community health strategy with a focus on maternal, newborn and child health.



Capacity Development

Kshs. 71,613,018 was sub-granted to 16 local organisations to strengthen their organisational systems in advocacy and HIV service delivery

- Worked with 27 public health facilities in Mombasa, Kakamega, Vihiga and Bungoma counties to scale-up integration of HIV services for LGBT individuals

Policy Reform Support

Using evidence from research and programme implementation to influence policy reforms at international, national and county levels, we achieved the following:

- Shared our implementation experience on Assisted Partner Notification Services at the ICASA 2017 in conjunction with WHO
- In partnership with OPTIONS consortium we provided technical support to 11 African Countries to develop strategies for PrEP roll-out to adolescent girls and young women
- Supported the review of the Guidelines on the use of ARVs for HIV prevention and treatment in Kenya
- Advocated for methadone (MAT) to be provided in a facility in Kiambu county

Offered technical support in the development and review of;

- HIV self-testing operational manual
- National assisted Partner Notification Services curriculum
- National HIV Testing Services Curriculum
- National PrEP providers' training curriculum
- National PrEP adherence information, education and communication materials for clients and providers

Adolescent and Youth Technical Support

During the year, we:

- Provided technical support to Mombasa County to develop the first Adolescent and Young People Strategy on HIV and SRH
- Supported 7 Young people to develop abstracts and 2 were presented at international conferences (IAS and NASCOP)
- Supported 10 Youth Advisory Council (YAC) members to participate in their respective quarterly county technical working groups on SRH and HIV
- Supported adolescents and young people to participate in the national review of Fast track plan to end HIV among adolescents and young people
- Supported Nairobi county youth focal person to train youth advisory council on peer engagement and attachment to health facilities to enhance uptake of services by adolescents and young people
- Mombasa county YAC supported to map out youth groups to engage in HIV and SRH information development and dissemination and strengthening of referrals and linkages

Research

To increase the uptake of results to inform HIV, SRH, GBV and health systems policy and practice through research, we:

- Supported the National Community Health and Development Unit (CHDU) in designing the national evaluation of the Strategy for Community Health Services and development of the Community Health Research Agenda
- Presented 28 oral and poster abstracts with best practices on HIV, GBV, community health in national and international conferences
- Conducted abstract writing training sessions for MoH teams from 5 counties, 14 abstracts were accepted for presentation in different local and international conferences.

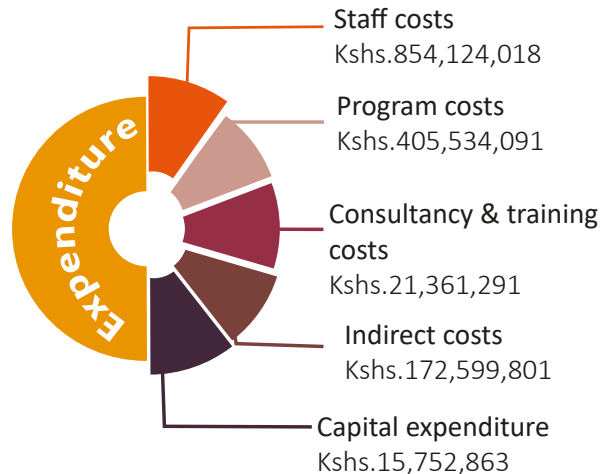
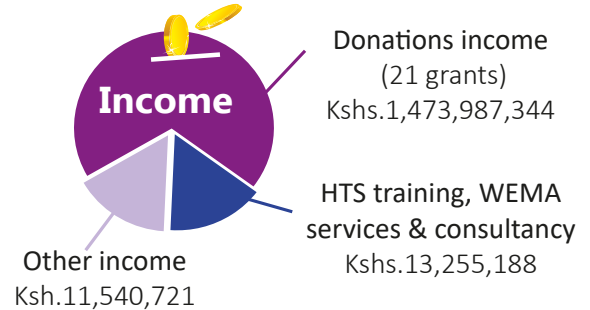
